Incident investigation is a formal or systematic process that involves documenting and analyzing an event in the workplace that resulted in loss or potential loss, including a thorough examination of contributing factors. The objective of incident investigation is to create recommendations that will eliminate the possibility of future loss. Incident investigation is an important element of occupational health and safety programmes and is an essential part of building a successful workplace safety culture. Reasons for carrying out incident investigations often include: Fulfilling legal requirementsAmar and complying with established safety proceduresPresidential to future accidents of a similar natureEinapoteinization of employee compensation claimsDemic concern for the well-being of employees Taking a step back, an accident can be described as an unintentional event leading to injury or property damage. An incident can be described as an unintentional event that does not result in injury or property damage. In addition, a risk can be described as the ability to do harm, while the risk is defined as the possibility of harm actually occurring. Other terms like Near Miss are used to describe incidents that could easily end up being serious accidents. Some jurisdictions avoid using the term accident because the latter term infers that the event could not have been avoided. They choose to use the incident instead, pointing out that most events are predictable and preventable. To the extent that the risk is managed, there is less chance of an accident occurring. The depth of the investigation should be appropriate for the seriousness of the situation with regard to actual or potential injury. The investigation should be carried out by someone familiar with the workplace, as well as have someone trained in the accident investigation process. Usually, the direct supervisor is involved, although the level of participation in the administration will often be affected by the severity of the accident. The more serious the accident, the more likely senior managers are to be involved. Employee participation also helps in effective research. These employees should be familiar with the work being done. These often include, but are not limited to, the health and safety representative, the union representative or others. In addition, external experts may be invited to participate. Research is reinforced by the perspectives of others who know the working and research processes. The initial investigation will include securing the scene as much as possible after assisting the injured worker, recording physical evidence, and then interviewing the workers. With this in mind, one approach commonly used is to use the technique of the Three Whys.
